ST BRIDE'S CHURCH, KELVINSIDE GLASGOW



The organ was built in 1864 by William Hill & Son for Anderston Parish Church – it was the first to be installed in the Established Church of Scotland. It was altered and enlarged by Harrison & Harrison in 1882. In 1972 it was moved to St Bride's Church by James MacKenzie, and was reconfigured for its new position.

In 2018 the organ was comprehensively restored by Harrison & Harrison. The work included replacing the modern pedalboard with a straight one in the style of Hill. The casework had been coated in several layers of paint and varnish; these were removed, and a painted and grained ('scumbled') finish was applied.
